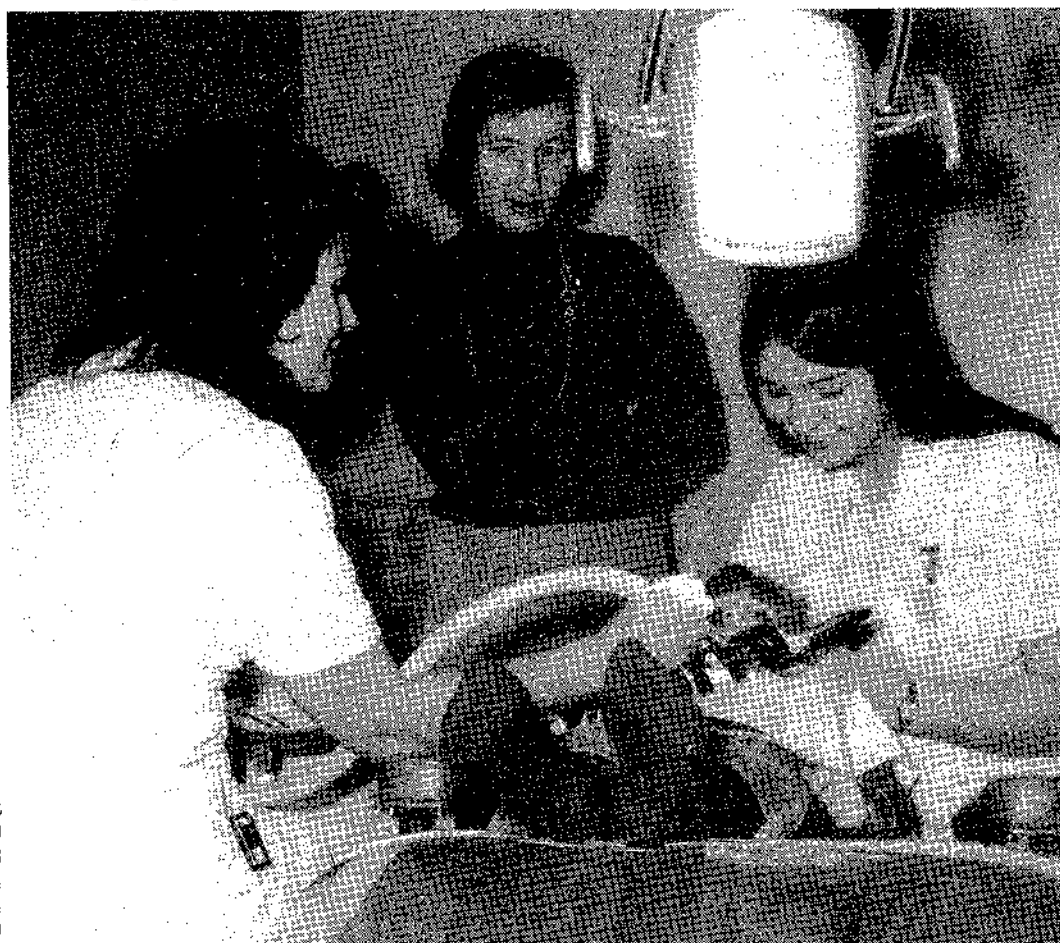

Dental Plan First for North America

The Saskatchewan Dental Plan, to provide dental care for children that began in September is the first of its kind to be implemented in North America.

In Canada today, the dental health of children is poor. Children in Saskatchewan receive only a fraction of the den-

ing 60% may not get any care at all, or at least not until some serious problems occur.

There are several reasons why this situation exists. First, there is a shortage of dentists, one dentist to serve approximately 4,320 people. What makes the situation even worse

the school boards in conjunction with the Department of Education. In the rural area schools have been identified dental clinics. Dental equipment has been pre-positioned in nine of these schools with portable equipment which will be utilized in the remaining

areas, where the ratio is approximately one dentist per 7,000 people.

While the main reason for the neglect of children's teeth is the serious shortage of dentists and the distribution factor, there are other causes. For some people, especially large families, it would be too costly to provide their children with regular dental care. Parental indifference is also to blame and for many adults dental health is not a priority, either for themselves, or their children.

The Saskatchewan Dental Plan was established to provide dental services to children who never had an opportunity to see a dentist, and relies on the services of dental nurses and assistants. Even though the concept of dental nurses is new to North America, they have been utilized very successfully in other countries, i. e. England, New Zealand and Australia.

In 1972, the government introduced legislation to permit the training of dental nurses for the first time in Saskatchewan, or in North America for that matter. A two - year training course was implemented at the Wascana Institute of Applied Arts and Sciences in Regina.

Dental nurses are educated in the treatment phases of pediatric dentistry - they are trained to carry out duties related to the prevention and dental care of children. They are trained to drill and fill cavities in permanent and baby teeth, administer anesthetic, extract baby teeth and place space maintainers. They study dental anatomy, proper cleaning techniques, nutrition and how to teach dental care.

This year there are three supervising dentists, 10 dental nurses, 15 certified dental assistants and two registered dental hygienists working in the Saskatoon Dental Region. The region follows school unit boundary lines and includes seven school units, as well as the city of Saskatoon. The seven rural school units are Saskatoon East, Saskatoon West, Lanigan, Govan, Long Lake, Davidson and Outlook. A dental nurse and assistant are situated in Watrous and another team in Outlook. These two teams are responsible for the five outlying school units, while the remaining eight dental teams serve the two units in close proximity to the city and the city of Saskatoon. As far as clinic space is concerned, this is provided by

used in the remaining 14 clinics and 23 other schools utilizing any available space.

The aim of the program is bring the service to the patient rather than take the child away from the school environment. In general, this creates a disruption.

This year, the services of dental health program are available only to children born

in 1968, who are registered under the Saskatchewan Hospital and Medical Care Plans. Consent forms have been sent to parents of all children eligible for the plan. Out of the 3,050 eligible children in this region, approximately 2,015 consents have been received to date. There is no deadline and children can be enrolled at any time during the year.
It is a totally voluntary program with services provided free of charge. The plan covers diagnosis, prevention, restoration and surgery. It does not cover major orthodontics and gold restorations.

Restorative dental services are tentatively set to begin in the following towns after March 18th, Hawarden, Glen-side, Strongfield, Macrorie and Conquest and latter part of May in Lucky Lake, Beechy and Elbow.
Before actual treatment begins, parents will be notified well in advance of the starting date. In the meantime if your child requires immediate dental attention you can contact (after hours) either Dorothy Lutz, (867-9323) or Doreen Grabowski (867-9149), who are serving the Outlook and Davidson school units or through regional office in Saskatoon at 652-5900. Parents living in Saskatoon West School Unit can contact Janice Hogg or Teresa Kemp, also at the regional office in Saskatoon.

gradually adjust the child to the dental environment, the first appointments have no treatment such as fillings, or extractions, except to relieve pain. X-rays and examinations by a dentist are usually carried out on the first visit. A treatment plan is then drawn up and a notice sent to parents indicating what dental work is required. Discussion of the treatment plan with parents, and prevention takes place on the second visit. The actual treatment starts at the child's third appointment and it is our intention that by this time the dental nurse team and the child have established a good relationship.
