

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Using new and existing data for official statistics



Statistics Canada provides researchers and policy makers with insight into our society and economy for the benefit of all Canadians; helping to answer questions and provide decision makers with the right information about complex issues that affect us all.

We collect data directly through traditional means such as by paper, by telephone, in person, but also through online and crowdsourcing surveys.

Statistics Canada has also been using existing data sources in official statistics for about 100 years. Today, many of our programs use existing data from government agencies and private sector organizations; which are collected as part of their ongoing operations. Statistics Canada integrates these data into official statistics to meet statistical and research requirements.

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

The International Study of Adults is now underway!

The International Study of Adults (ISA), an initiative of the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD), aims to gain insight into the skills and competencies of adults aged 16 to 65 years in 32 participating countries. In Canada, the ISA is conducted by Statistics Canada in partnership with Employment and Social Development Canada (ESDC) and the Council of Ministers of Education Canada (CMEC).

From September 2, 2022, to April 30, 2023, Statistics Canada interviewers will contact households selected to participate in the ISA. A letter has been sent to these households to explain the interview process and the importance of participating in this voluntary study.

The purpose of the survey

The [ISA](#) will collect new data on the abilities and experiences of adults in Canada by learning about their various everyday activities, such as reading, finding information, using computers and technology, as well as their education and work experience. As in the [previous cycle of the ISA in 2012](#), some off reserve Indigenous households were selected to participate in the second cycle of the study in order to have up-to-date and relevant data. These data will shed light on issues that are important to Indigenous peoples, such as health, education, and social programs.

Your participation is important

The results from this study will help educators as well as education policymakers and researchers offer programs that will benefit communities. The ISA will provide more information on the numeracy and literacy skills of populations. These skills are important for finding a job, receiving good health care, prolonging life expectancy and contributing to the community.

In addition, your participation will help ensure Canada is:

- preparing for future learning demands
- providing the skills Canadians need to succeed at work and in everyday life
- shaping a new path for technological advancement
- understanding how the adult population is faring compared with other countries.

Your information will remain confidential

All information collected by Statistics Canada is strictly confidential and is protected by the Statistics Act. Statistics Canada cannot release any information that would identify you or any member of your household without your consent.
